1. Marshal accreditation

Marshal accreditation is the process by which our Sport accredits its marshals from Trainee to International Marshal.

This eight (8) stages process will ensure that our regions have a high standard of marshals for Buhurt International events.

1.1 Stages overview

- Stage 1 Learning the rules
- Stage 2 Working at events with a Regional Head Marshal
- Stage 3 Taking the regional marshal accreditation test
- Stage 4 Working at one event with a Conference Head Marshal
- Stage 5 Taking the conference marshal accreditation test
- Stage 6 Interviewing with a Conference Head Marshal
- Stage 7 Becoming an accredited Conference Marshal
- Stage 8 Becoming an accredited International Marshal

1.1.1 Stage 1: Learning the rules

Marshal trainees are not permitted in the list while fighting is occurring.

Before they can work in the list, marshal trainees will need to read all the rules from

Buhurt International. Below are some ideas to help you:

- Download and print all rules and regulations found on the Buhurt International website.
- Ask your Regional Head Marshal questions on rules you are unsure of.

1.1.2 Stage 2: Working at events with a Regional Head Marshal

To qualify as a Regional Marshal, a trainee marshal must participate in one of the following options:

Three (3) tournaments, ensuring they have experience in the following categories at least once:

- Buhurt
- Duels
- Outrance (optional)

Two (2) tournaments, and one (1) official regional training event (seminar) with a Regional Head Marshal. Ensuring they have experience in the following categories at least once:

- Buhurt
- Duels
- Outrance (optional)

Marshal trainees will be paired with a Regional Marshal, a Conference Marshal or an International Marshal to learn from them.

Below are some ideas to help you:

- Observe the accredited marshals' work in and out of the list.
- Talk and ask questions to the Marshal you are paired with, and to the knight marshal.
- Participate in all marshaling activities of the event (e.g. weapons check, armor check, counting duels and buhurt observation).

1.1.3 Stage 3: Taking the regional marshal accreditation test

Once the marshal trainee has worked at the required number of events, they will be able to take the regional accreditation test, which consists of ten (10) questions.

The test will cover:

- buhurt,
- duels.
- weapon's basic authenticity rules.

Below are some ideas to help you.

- Talk and ask questions to the knight marshal.
- Study all Buhurt International rules and regulations sets.

If they have passed the test:

- They are now accredited Regional Marshal.
- They will be given a Regional Marshal certificate.
- They are allowed to work as either a line marshal or a field marshal.

1.1.4 Stage 4: Working at one event with a Conference Head Marshal

To become a Conference Marshal, a Regional Marshal will be required to work:

- at one (1) event with the Conference Head Marshal,
- on all aspects of marshaling at this event (e.g. weapons check, armor check, counting duels and buhurt observation).

After the event, the Conference Head Marshal will let the Regional Marshal know if they are ready to take the conference accreditation test or if they need to participate in another event with them.

Below are some ideas to help you:

- Talk and ask questions to the knight marshal.
- Participate in all marshaling activities of the event.

1.1.5 Stage 5: Taking the conference marshal accreditation test

Once the Regional Marshal has worked at the required number of events, they will be able to take the conference accreditation test, which consists of forty (40) questions.

The test will cover:

- buhurt,
- duels.
- weapon's basic authenticity rules.

Below are some ideas to help you.

- Talk and ask questions to the knight marshal.
- Study all Buhurt International rules and regulations sets.

1.1.6 Stage 6: Interviewing with a Conference Head Marshal

Once the Regional Marshal has completed the conference accreditation test, they will have an interview with their Conference Head Marshal.

In this interview, the wrong and/or incomplete answers from the test will be reviewed, and the Conference Head Marshal may ask further questions.

Below are some ideas to help you.

- Be thorough and honest in your answers.
- The Conference Head Marshal is there to help you, not to fail you.

1.1.7 Stage 7: Becoming an accredited Conference Marshal

If the Regional Marshal has failed the conference accreditation test and/or interview:

- They keep their regional accreditation.
- They will need to repeat stages 4, 5 and 6 again until they receive their conference accreditation.

If they have passed the test and the interview:

- They are now accredited Conference Marshal.
- They will be given a Conference Marshal certificate.
- They are allowed to work as either a line marshal, a field marshal, or a knight marshal.

1.1.8 Stage 8: Becoming an accredited International Marshal

The International Marshal accreditation is the highest accreditation a marshal can obtain.

Before a marshal can attempt the International Marshal accreditation process, they must have:

- A Conference Marshal accreditation.
- 2 video recordings of them working at 2 separate Buhurt International events.

Once the Buhurt International Marshal Committee has reviewed the 2 recordings, the Committee will have an interview with the marshal, in which they will go over any questions they have about the videos. The committee may also ask any other questions that they may have.

- Video recordings
- These events may be from the Regional and Conference Marshal Process.
- These videos must be given to the Buhurt International Marshal Committee to review.
- The Buhurt International Marshal Committee will review these videos to make sure the Marshal is at a particular skill level.

If you have failed your Interview process

- You will continue being a Conference Marshal.
- You will need to repeat the Buhurt International Marshal Accreditation Process until you receive your accreditation.

If you have passed your Interview,

- You are now an Internationally Accredited Marshal.
- This means you are allowed to work in Buhurt International events that require this particular Accreditation.
- You will be given a Buhurt International Marshal Certificate.

4. Maintain International Marshal Accreditation

To maintain Marshal Accreditation, Marshals are required to Marshal 2 Events per calendar year.
